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113th Open promises much, says Bennett

The 113th Taranaki men's open fours, which commences in New Plymouth and surrounding areas this morning, has all the makings of a top tournament, says Bowls Taranaki chairman, Brien Bennett QSM.

Everything is in order for a brilliant week of bowls, Bennett said. "While the weather forecast at this stage may show some rain on Wednesday, locals will confirm that the forecasters have predicting rain in these parts for three months — but we are in an official drought!"

The greens advisory panel are comfortable with all of the chosen venues, with inspections haven't taken place 10 days ago.

Inglewood will not be used this year, as its only natural surface was re-sown during the winter, but all of the other greens should be familiar with regular competitors.

Neither will the Stratford-Avon greens be used, despite them being as good as any in the province. The Taranaki centre has a long-standing rule that it will play on the best greens available — but within the divisions where the event has been allocated to.

Same format as last time - and some

Today's Taranaki Open repeats the same format that has basically remained unchanged for over 70 years.

All 156 teams will play two games of 25 ends today, tomorrow, Wednesday and Thursday, with those sides winning six or more games advancing to Friday's post section rounds.

And, unlike last season, when we believed that we didn't have sufficient greens of quality in the north, this year we do."

Bennett said, overall, the Board of Bowls Taranaki are happy with the entry of 156 teams. "Of course, we always want more. But considering that we have had five withdrawals since entries closed, it is satisfactory - and two up on last year.

The only changes to the published programme are Sonny Hokai's Far North side being replaced in section two by a composite team headed by Inglewood's Don Gyde; and the use of the New Plymouth No 1 green as opposed to New Plymouth No 2.

"All is set for a great week."

Plenty of action-packed sections

The field of 156 teams have been divided into 12 Ross Thorn (Naenae) and Manawatu rep sections, some of which promise some real action during the first four days of qualifying.

Section one includes past Bowls NZ chairman John Carter (Hutt), David Hood (Kerikeri), who has been a consistent performer at the NZ Open and has won a bucket-load of titles in the Far North, Tony Holdsworth (Mt Albert), the 1994 Dominion singles runner-up, and Graham Fulford (playing under the Australian banner this week), who was part of John Granger's 2002 winning Open team.

Youthful Adam Wishnoski (New Lynn) leads section two, which includes two useful West End sides, Neil Candy and John Sexton, Graham Baxter (Hawera Park) and Ian Lowry (Rahotu), while Cliff Mitchell-Burnard (Te Kuiti) returns.

Brian Little (Palmerston North), the 2016 champion, returns to the skipping role this year and his side appears the most likely in section three. The group includes another past winner, Darren Goodin (Paritutu), Wellington gold star holder Brent Stubbins (Johnsonville) and Terry Osment (Te Awamutu).

The O'Sullivan family team from Inglewood are reunited in 2018, with Gerry again taking the skip berth. They feature in section four, alongside Ray Hudson (Central Levin), Les Dempster-Rivett (Frankton Junction) and Kevin Coombe (Aramoho).

Barry Wynks (Takaro), a member of the NZ Para team for this year's Commonwealth Games, skips a new-look team in section five, where the favoured teams include dual winner Mark Anderson (Alton), Peter Dorreen (Far North Dominion pairs champion Peter Clark RSA) and Ian Coombe (Mairangi Bay).

After a long absence, Howard Ivory (Wilton) returns with the 1989 champion John Earles at No 3. They are in section seven along with Gerard Slattery (Hinuera) and Mike Cavanagh (Pukekohe).

Stu Settle (Hinuera), the 2014 winner, remains an excellent supporter of the Open. His side will tangle in section eight with the likes of Terry Cullen (Helensville), Roger Neilson (Wanganui East), Noel Probyn (Fitzroy) and Garry Murfitt (West End).

Cary Pinker's Wanganui East side were semifinalists in 2016, but they face a tough qualifying draw in section nine. They play prominent Hawke's Bay bowler Ian Mason (Havelock North) this afternoon, Dave Selby (Hillcrest) on Tuesday, and then on Wednesday, meet two of the most consistent skips in the Open of this generation, Rex Holmes (Paraparaumu Beach) and Gary Lilley (West End).

Section 10 comprises a number of very solid units, including Bernie Martelletti (Te Puke), Ray Park (Wanganui), Ian Andrews (Paritutu) and Anton Ferrari (Wilton).

Former international Dan Delany (Royal Oak), a four-time winner and the 2017 runner-up, again poses a big threat from section 11. He will tangle with Wellington CEO Dave Hewitt (Silverstream), Warren Bellringer (New Plymouth) and the 1987 (Tauranga South).

2017 was Ces Bell's year; but Hawke's Bay team has not returned

Taradale's Ces Bell won his second Taranaki Open fours 12 months ago when he skipped his side of Frank Grantham, Ken Smith and Fred Ellison to the title.

In the final, the Hawke's Bay side defeated Dan Delany and his Auckland team of Mike Nasey, Norman Scott-Morrison and Joe Whitelaw 27-15 at the West End greens.

Unfortunately, Smith died during the winter. The loss of his close bowling mate had a significant impact on Bell, who skipped an Aramoho side to win the title in 1992. He has in fact not played at all this season. "I would love to come back and attempt to defend the title," Bell said. "But my heart is just not in bowls at the moment."

In last year's semifinals, Bell came from behind to beat Wanganui East's Carey Pinker, while Delany withheld — just — a storming

fight-back from Aramoho's Peter Belliss, winning by one shot.



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Some upsets in hot, humid conditions

Hot, humid conditions greeted bowlers on the first day of the 113th Taranaki men's Open fours in New Plymouth and surrounding areas yesterday.

By the end of the day, as predicted, most of the big guns had emerged unscathed – but there were exceptions, including past Dominion pairs winners Dan Delany (Royal Oak) and Rex Holmes (Paraparaumu Beach), who along with three-time winner Gary Lilley (West End), Cary Pinker (Wanganui East), Mark Anderson (Alton) and Stu Settle (Hinuera) all dropped a match during the day. The plight of the 2003 winner Russell Hardy (Tower) was even grimmer, his side losing both games which means that they must win the remaining six matches.

But there were a host of top teams who didn't have too many problems, even though by the end of the day, some greens had begun to show signs of burning.

Heading that list of visitors were Brian Little (Palmerston North), Barry Wynks (Takaro), Peter Dorreen (Far North RSA), Howard Ivory (Wilton), Ray Park (Wanganui), Peter Clark (Tauranga South) and Peter Belliss (Aramoho).

A number of Taranaki teams also got off on the right footing with two wins, including Craig Johns (West End), Ian Andrews (Paritutu), Graham Baxter (Hawera Park) and Fred Hughes (Lepperton).

After sneaking home 18-17 against Mervyn Jackman (Wainuiomata), the Lepperton side had the satisfaction of upsetting Holmes, who has made the Open final on three separate occasions, 23-19.

Delany fell in his first match 24-20 to Evert Kremer, a two-winner from Paraparaumu Beach. But Delany got back on track in beating Ian Busby (Tower) 25-18 in the afternoon.

Lilley dropped his match to Mike Oldfield (Tauranga South) 22-18, while Anderson was ousted 25-22 by Alan Sandercock (Australia).

Settle's loss was no complete surprise, being tipped up 28-24 in the feature game of the morning by Noel Probyn (Fitzroy). Settle rebounded to win in the afternoon, whereas Probyn was defeated by another team with a

50% record, Garry Murfitt (West End).

Hardy's opening loss was to Pihama's underrated Terry Mullin 23-20 and his hopes took a further dive to Peter Thomson (Paekakariki) 24-23.

John Carter produces goods in thrilling win

Long-serving bowls administrator John Carter proved to be the right man for the occasion when he guided his Wellington team to its second-successive victory on the first day of the 2018 Taranaki men's open fours tournament yesterday afternoon at the Paritutu greens.

Carter, who served as both president and chairman of Bowls New Zealand, has been a regular visitor and solid competitor to the Taranaki tournament, with his best placing being a quarterfinal berth in 2001.

His 2018 side remains the same as that of re-

cent memory with Bruce "Godfather" Woodhouse (pictured right), Bill Jackson and former Wellington CEO, Don McMurray. The side opened with a comfortable 29-13 win over Waimea's Ian Schofield, but in the afternoon became locked in an intriguing battle with George Hindi's side from Australia's Sunshine Coast. The two teams

were seldom separated by more than two shots, and when the 25th and final commenced, Carter led by one.

Hindi's side called the tune on the final end, although a valiant attempt by McMurray, where he touched the jack but left it behind, saw the Australians hold one shot on the skipchangeover.

Hindi drew a top shot, giving his side the two it needed to win. But captain Carter had other ideas, pushing into the head and spilling the jack back to one of Jackson's bowls. Hindi, on the push as well, narrowly missed, leaving Carter's crew the winners at 24-22.

Carter's side was one of five from section one to emerge from the opening day with the perfect record. Joining them were former Taranaki development rep Neville Goldsworthy (Fitzroy), decorated Far North titleholder David Hood (Kerikeri), the consistent Ian Porteous (Aramoho) and Graham Frater (Inglewood).

After the disappointment of missing out on qualifying last year, Hood's side had a close shave in its opening match against New Ply-

mouth's Albie Waitere, who skipped the winning team at last year's Aotearoa Maori bowls championships, Hood sneaking home 24-23. The men from the far north were emphatic in the afternoon, accounting for a strong side skipped by Graeme Fulford (Australia) 30-7.

Delany's team suffers second set-back

Former Blackjack Dan Delany (Royal Oak), a four-time winner of the Taranaki Open fours, suffered his second defeat during section play of the 113th tournament at Fitzroy yesterday afternoon.

Delany is skipping a familiar side with Mike Nasey and Joe Whitelaw, two players who have shared in multiple Open successes, and one newcomer this year, Gary Cotter. Cotter impressed in last year's event leading for a Hamilton side.

After a loss and a win on Monday, Delany appeared in reasonable touch in beating Russell Haddock (Wanganui) 25-17 yesterday morning.

But in the afternoon, the Delany side ran into a wily team from Tauranga South of Robbie Frelan, dual Dominion fours winner Maurice Hickey, John Simons and 1987 Dominion pairs winner Peter Clark.

Clark is now 82, but still one of the best skips going around. His team, after two wins on Monday, were somewhat smarting, having seen a lead in the morning evaporate as they fell 18-15 to three-winner Ross Henderson (West End).

But the Bay of Plenty team turned things around in the last round of the day, prevailing 30-19 to keep themselves in a solid over-night position. The loss left Delany's team needing to win their last four matches.

This morning they face Warren Bellringer (New Plymouth), who skips the only side in the section with an unblemished record.

Bellringer's team received its sternest test to date when it beat Dave Hewitt (Silverstream) 25-16 in the morning and then accounted for Richard Death (Te Awamutu) 27-6 in the later round.

Delany is not alone in the two-win, two-loss department, with a number of other teams predicted to qualify also in the same boat.

Those teams include Adam Wishnoski (New Lynn), Rex Holmes (Paraparaumu Beach), Cary Pinker (Wanganui East) and Steve Hoeft (Pt Chevalier).

The most noted causality is Russell Hardy (Tower), after the 2003 winner dropped his morning game 26-15 to three-winner Trevor Rayner (Tawa).

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Close matches as field reduced to only 12

Close games were the order of the day as the 44 qualifiers were reduced to 12 surviving teams in the 113th Taranaki men's Open fours at Paritutu and West End yesterday.

The morning round saw three matches decided on an extra end, while three other games saw teams score sufficient points to overtake their opponents on the 25th end.

Of the 12 teams remaining, four are already into the quarterfinals. Those teams will still play at 9am today, alongside the four remaining last-16 games, on the front green at Paritutu.

Many of the leading teams fell during the day's play and that opportunity has been seized upon by the teams that remain alive.

The two confirmed quarterfinals feature Noel Probyn (Fitzroy) against Richard Meacle (Australia) and Peter Thomson (Paekakariki) playing Ross Henderson (West End).

The other games, at the last 16 stage, see Steve Hoeft (Pt Chevalier) opposing Ian Coombe (Mairangi Bay), Adam Wishnoski (New Lynn) playing Ray Park (Wanganui), an all-Wilton clash between Howard Ivory and Anton Ferrari, and Darren Goodin (Paritutu) squaring off against Peter Belliss (Aramoho).

Probyn's side, which is in fact being skipped by Ian Mahoney and includes Tony Walsh and Nigel Newton, nudged through both games by a single shot – 24-23 over Mark Anderson (Alton) in the morning and then 22-21 over Barry Wynks (Takaro).

The match with Anderson was close throughout, but things had turned doubtful for Probyn when trailing 22-16 with three ends remaining. But a count of seven on the next end, followed by a single on the penultimate head, gave Probyn a two-shot lead playing the last, which the side protected.

After leading Wynks 8-1, play tightened,

with the Manawatu four hitting the front 12-11. A three on the next end, the 15th, however, gave the lead back to Probyn. It was a lead that

Thomson, a Kapiti rep, advanced into the last eight for the first time, skipping his side of Henry Yee, Kurt Burgess and Ged Ebbrell to two hard-fought victories. In the morning, from 14-11 down after 19 ends against Mort Jones (Hillcrest), Thomson grabbed a single, a three and a five, and then held on to win 21-16. Later, a count of four on the 16th end – the teams had been locked at 12-all – was crucial in the side ending the hopes of the 2010 runner-up Cliff Mitchell-Burnard (Te Kuiti) 21-15.

Dix the star turn as title heads to Auckland

Playing superb bowls 30-year-old Brody Dix was the star turn as he skipped his New Lynn side to victory in the 113th Taranaki men's Open fours at the Paritutu greens in New Plymouth on last evening.

Dix turned on a brilliant display of bowls in the final as his side of Adam Wishnoski, Keith Ansell and Gary Doughtery overcame Paritutu's Don Christensen, Allan Batley, Rodger Hassall and skip Darren Goodin 29-16.

Dix converted four of the opening ends from negatives into positives and that gave the New Lynn side the confidence that it could win the match. They edged ahead to 7-4 after seven ends when an early tea break was called.

On the return, Dix rode his luck. Three down on the head and attacking, he came off a wing bowl and spliced the jack back into the ditch. It left New Lynn with three shots and it retained those when Goodin's final bowl tittered on the ditch before flopping in. Goodin added two fine shots on the next end to give Paritutu four, meaning at 10-8 the game was still alive. But Dix magically trailed the jack, when one down, on the next end to net a count of four.

It became a game changer, with the New Lynn team playing more confidently and building better heads.

With No 2 Ansell in particular playing great bowls, Dix moved further in front, extending the lead to 20-9. Goodin pulled it back to 22-15 with five ends remaining.

But New Lynn finished the stronger.
