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Morning "sprinkles" fails to dampen enthusiasm

Two rain "sprinkles" at 7am and at the conclusion of the first round failed to dampen the enthusiasm of competitors as the 114th Taranaki men's open fours got underway in New Plymouth and surrounding area yesterday.

Blustery winds, especially in the afternoon round, coupled with the showers, meant the temperature was much more kinder to bowlers. But those same conditions also caused some problems for some of the favoured sides who dropped matches during the day.

The most prominent team to slip-up was Brody Dix's New Lynn side. Dix and his side of Adam Wishnoski, Keith Ansell and Gary Dougherty, the 2018 champions, had to work overtime to dispel the challenge of Motueka's Kerry Bishop 28-26 first up.

But there was no escape in the afternoon, when Dix's side was defeated 36-24 by Geoff Cagney (Sunshine Coast). It means the New Lynn side can only afford one more loss in section play. Although, given that they lost two of their opening three games last season, and still marched majestically to

the title, there is no need for any panic in their camp yet.

Another surprise was the opening loss incurred by West End's Craig Faria, pictured right. De Faria, formerly Johns, has been in excellent touch this season, having ready claimed the

Section three at New Plymouth No 2 produced the most talking points from the second day's play in the 114th Taranaki men's open fours yesterday.

All-time great, Peter Belliss, suffered his first loss of the tournament in the morning, losing 25-23 to Ray Glogoski (Kerikeri). But the Wanganui side returned emphatically in the afternoon, beating Tower's Mark Anderson 29-11.

Anderson had walloped Rahotu's Peter Charteris 35-3 in the morning to still be in a very strong position to qualify with three wins. Glogoski is also on the same count. After their mighty win in the morning, the team from the north fell 26-17 to two-winner Colin Boyle (Epsom).

At the same time, Kevin Smith's Hinuera side, including Brendan Brill, Bruce Milne and Stu Settle, also had their first loss, 20-19, to another two-winner, Paul Hassall (Tawa).

But while the more prominent names in section three were being tripped up, Garry Banks (Beach Haven), pictured right, managed to keep his side ticking along to end the day as the only

Section four provides two of the qualifiers— Drew and Lowry. Drew snaked through two tight games 25-22 against Darren Scott (West End) and 21-20 over Don Ramsey (Pukekohe). The Lowry family were emphatic in their two wins over local combinations.

Pinker has impressed during the opening days. That trend continued yesterday as they secured their qualification 28-17 over Ian Coombe (Mairangi Bay).

Newton didn't have things all his own way but still got home 27-21 over Dennis Osborne (West End) and 30-25 against Kevin Newson (Seatoun).

Delany inflicted the second defeat on Chris Carter (Parklands) 26-17 and then eliminated Mike Oldfield (Tauranga South) 23-13.

Goodin, Selby and Holmes all continued their positive positions by posting trouble-free victories in both rounds.

Finals this year to be held at West End

Bowls Taranaki president Brien Bennett QSM has announced that this year's finals will be held at West End.

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Old fashion rule not needed but only just

An old fashion rule, that was last required, it is believed, in the 1950s, was almost used as the 166 original entries were reduced to the last 39 in the 114th Taranaki men's Open fours yesterday.

In order to qualify for today's post section rounds, teams needed to win six matches from eight. But there was an over-rider. If a section did not have any side with six or more wins, then the winner(s) of the most games in the section would advance.

Heading into the final round of section two, there were no qualifiers. Three teams sat on five wins, all of whom had to play sides with four wins.

A further two sides also sat on four wins and because their chances were still alive, they too played.

Eventually, two teams — 2017 Dominion singles winner Dean Elgar (West End) and former Bowls NZ chairman John Carter (Hutt) — gained their sixth wins.

Carter was all-square playing the last end and held shot. Opposing skip, Kevin Ratahi (Opunake), rattled the head, dislodging the jack to the back of the head. But the jack went to Carter's team, leaving his side the winner 24-22, and remarkably, the only qualifier from Wellington.

Elgar didn't get things all his way, either, but got home 22-18 over Joe Johansen (Bay View).

The elimination of all of the other teams from the Capital was a major surprise. There were a number of hard luck stories in the eighth round.

Allan Brider (Johnsonville) lost 26-25 to Grayson McEldowney (New Plymouth), in a match both teams needed to qualify.

Ross Thorn (Naenae), playing Inglewood's Gerry O'Sullivan, who had already qualified, was pipped 24-23.

Anton Ferrari (Naenae) missed out 27-24 to

five-winner Nelson West (Inglewood).

And Brent Stubbins (Miramar) also fell one game short when his side went down 22-12 to the tournament's No 1 entertainer, Tupu Campbell (Far North RSA).

On the flip-side, there were some very close, positive shaves. 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One Taranaki team and three visitors in semis

There will be one team each from Taranaki, Manawatu, North Harbour and Auckland that will contest the semifinals of the 114th Taranaki men's Open fours at West End this morning.

The semifinals will feature defending champion Brody Dix (New Lynn) against the 2016 winner Brian Little (Palmerston North) while Craig De Faria (West End) plays Nigel Drew (Birkenhead). De Faria, formerly Johns, won the title leading for John Lambert in 1987.

Inevitably, there were a number of significant moments during yesterday's rounds, as the field was reduced from 16 to four.

The most spectacular conclusion occurred in Drew's 19-17 quarterfinal win over Tower's Bruce Phillips.

Playing with Mark Rumble, Lionel Drew — father of Nigel — and Randall Watkins, the Birkenhead side was locked in a tight contest throughout against Phillips. However, when they took the lead at 11-10 after 14 ends, they never relinquished it.

Commencing the 25th end, Drew led by one. At the first attempt, Phillips killed the head with his last bowl.

On the replay, Phillips' No 3, Scott Roberts, drew two beauties. Watkins reduced the count to one. But Phillips, with his last delivery, drew another fine shot. Nigel Drew, playing positively on the narrow hand, pushed one of his team's bowls in for shot to snatch victory.

It was a tough end for what had been a glorious week for the Phillips side, which contained Mark Kuklinski and John Roberts up front. But even in defeat the Hawera-based side agreed that they had been beaten by a brilliant bowl.

Drew's semifinal opponent, De Faria, had a relatively trouble-free day. The side completely blew away Cary Pinker's Wanganui East team of brother Warwick, Peter Head and Les Smith 25-7 in the quarterfinals, with just 16 ends played.

After opening up a 9-0 lead after three ends, De Faria picked up a six on the fifth end to lead 15-1. One down on the head, De Faria, on the drive, hit a short bowl into the head, dislodging the only Pinker bowl. De Faria then added the bonus to take the six.

Little's team, which is the same that won in 2016, — brothers Brian and Ron Henn and Ian Monaghan — prevailed 25-23 over West End's Dean Elgar in a close quarterfinal.

Elgar's team of Steve Temperton, John Garrud and Neil Candy dropped three fours during the match, which proved costly in the end.

Despite those numbers, Elgar remained in touch, with the scores locked at 19-all after 19 ends.

But Little then grabbed a three, a single and a two, the mini break giving the Manawatu centre secretary a big enough advantage to hold on.

Dix and his side of Adam Wishnowski, Keith Ansell and Gary Dougherty ended Dan Delany's hopes of a fifth Open with a 22-15 win. But the match was much closer than that, even though Dix's side proved to be the more consistent unit.

From 12-11 in front after 14 ends, Dix improved his position to 17-11 ahead. With three ends remaining, the score had become 18-15. Dix then took a three to extend the margin. However, Delany and his side of Neville Hill, Mike Nasey and Joe Whitelaw held a three on the next, before Dix, with his last bowl, drew a magic shot. Delany, after missing his drive, conceded.

Elgar and Pinker both produced superb final deliveries in the morning round to ensure their sides made it through to the quarterfinals.

The West End quartet proved too consistent for Brian Little's Palmerston North team winning 24-13 in the final, that was played in occasional light drizzle.

Little's side of Brian Henn, Ron Henn and Ian Monaghan started the decider brightly, leading 7-0 after four ends. Three ends later the score was 8-2. It could have been even greater, except De Faria minimised the damage.
