# 75 years ago: Mort Squire wins second Open

Taranaki's greatest ever bowler, Mort Squire, pictured right, skipped his Hawera side to victory in the 1950 Open.

Having previously won in 1942, Squire was operating at the peak of his powers at the time and it remains a mystery to this day that he was not selected for the New Zealand side for the Auckland Empire Games, which commenced soon after the completion of the Open.

A "dicky" heart was one such theory, although personalities and politics were prevalent away back then also.

However, there was no denying the class of Squire both as a player and skip.
